1 RULES: The Regatta will be governed by:

- 1.1 The racing rules as defined by the Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS),
- 1.2 The relevant one-design class rules for boats racing in one-design classes, excepting,
- 1.3 There will be no age limit for any class.

2 SAILING INSTRUCTIONS:

2.1 Sailing Instruction will be available after December 12th online on the SCYC website, emailed to registrants that provide an email address, and posted on the registration board at the St. Croix Yacht Club.

7.1 The Low Point Scoring system, Appendix A, will apply; no score will be excluded. There may be as many as twelve races, of which one shall be completed to constitute a series.

8.1 Prizes will be awarded for 1st thru 3rd place for each Class.

9 RISK STATEMENT AND DISCLAIMER OF RESPONSIBILITIES

RRS 3 states: 'The responsibility for a boat's decision to participate in a race or to continue to race is hers alone.' By participating in this event each competitor agrees and acknowledges that sailing is a potentially dangerous activity with inherent risks. These risks include strong winds and rough seas, sudden changes in weather, failure of equipment, boat handling errors, poor seamanship by other boats, loss of balance on an unstable platform and fatigue resulting in increased risk of injury. Inherent in the sport of sailing is the risk of permanent, catastrophic injury or death by drowning, trauma, hypothermia, or other causes.
